- Publius Quinctilius Varus and his men fall under attack in the Teutoburg Forest in 9 AD
- Ambushed by Arminius, leader of the tribe of the Cherusci
- Legiones XVII, XVIII, and XIX are annihilated








Germanicus visits the battlefield in 15 AD

TANEN'S.

- Not a True Military Man
 - "Varus was a man of mild character and of a quiet disposition, somewhat slow in mind as he was in body, and more accustomed to the leisure of the camp than to actual service in war."
- Greedy and Irresponsible
 - "That he was no despiser of money is demonstrated by his governorship of Syria: he entered the rich province a poor man, but left it a rich man and the province poor."
- Naïve About the Character of the Germans
 - "With this purpose in mind he entered the heart of Germany as though he were going among a people enjoying the blessings of peace."

<u>Varus</u>



- Refuses to Listen To the Warning of Segestes
- Lack of Professionalism
 - "They had with them many wagons and many beasts of burden as in time of peace; moreover, not a few women and children and a large retinue of servants were following them."
- Lack of Organization
 - "For the Romans were not proceeding in any regular order, but were mixed in helter-skelter with the wagons and the unarmed, and so, being unable to form readily anywhere in a body, and being fewer at every point than their assailants, they suffered greatly and could offer no resistance at all."














Could anyone else be to blame?

- Livia




A conspiracy theory in the novel Ovid blames Livia

Aftermath of the Battle

- Varus is decapitated; Arminius sends his head to Maroboduus, leader of the Marcomanni
- The Romans win some minor battles in Germania, but by 16 AD, Tiberius withdraws his forces back to the west of the Rhine
- Germanicus dies in Syria in 19 AD
- Arminius is unable to unite the German tribes; he dies in a civil war in 21 AD




